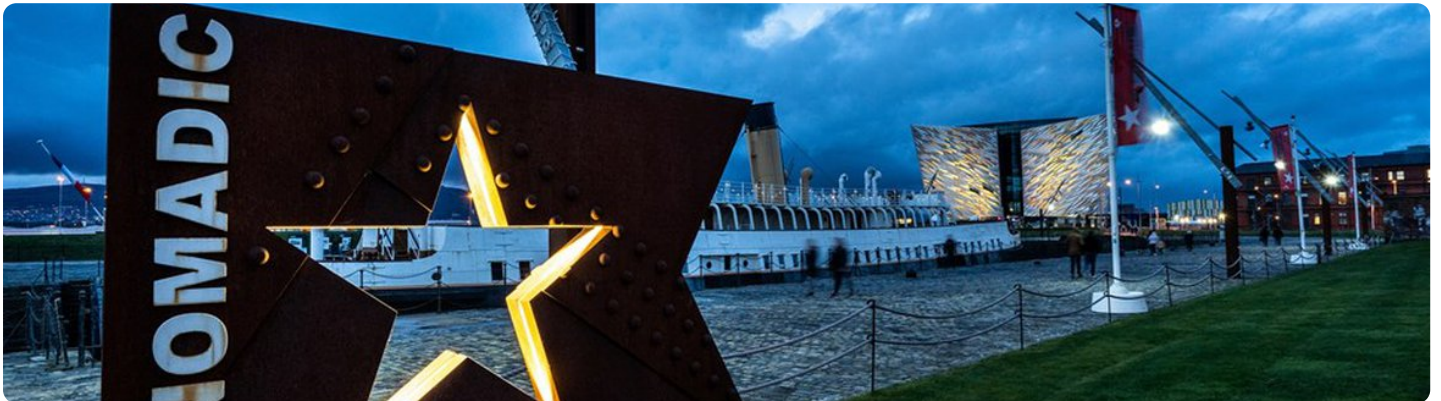

Paddy Campbell's Belfast Famous Black Cab Tour



Why not enjoy an escorted tour of Greater Belfast's historical sites. Let your experienced driver take you on a journey back in time to explore the many places of interest. You choose what you want to see or simply leave it to the driver.

There is lots to see, such as:

Belfast Nationalist Murals & The Peace Line

The political murals of the Falls and the Shankill tell their own graphic story of what has been called "The Troubles" in Ireland's recent history. See the infamous Peaceline, a wall built to keep Nationalists and Loyalists apart and in the process divided the communities.

Crumlin Road Jail and Court House

These Victorian buildings played a major part in the conflict in Ireland for over 160 years, convicting, imprisoning and even executing many of those in the war. These buildings have witnessed the uncovering of many ruthless killings and bombings and have seen many escape attempts.

Belfast City Hall

Built during 1896-1906 by Alfred Brumwell Thomas, it is the home of Belfast City Council. This magnificent Edwardian "wedding cake" was built to reflect Belfast's City status which was granted by

Queen Victoria in 1888. The Dome is 53 metres (173 feet) high. Above the door it says "Hibernia encouraging and promoting the Commerce and Arts of the city". You may go inside to find out about guided tours and to pick up leaflets explaining the statues in the surrounding gardens.

Albert Memorial Clock

Located in Victoria Street and built by WJ Barrie in 1865, the tower leans 1.25 metres (4 feet) off the vertical, the Clock's unsteadiness is due the the fact that it was built on land reclaimed from the river. The tower is 35 metres (113 feet) high and centres around Prince Albert, Victoria's consort. Crowned lions holding shields and floral decoration surround the clock itself.

Crown Liquor Saloon

The Crown on Great Victoria Street was built 1839-1840 and is owned by the National Trust. Drinkers of the city know well it's opulent marble, brilliant Italian tile work, fine glass engraving, embossed ceiling and cosy booths bedecked with gryphons and lions. Panels in the restaurant on the first floor were meant for the Britannic, the sister ship of the Titanic.

Titanic

Built in Belfast, it was perhaps the most famous ship that ever sailed, sinking on her maiden voyage. See where she was designed and built at Harland and Wolfe shipyard and stand on the dockside where she was tied up in 1912 before her fateful journey.

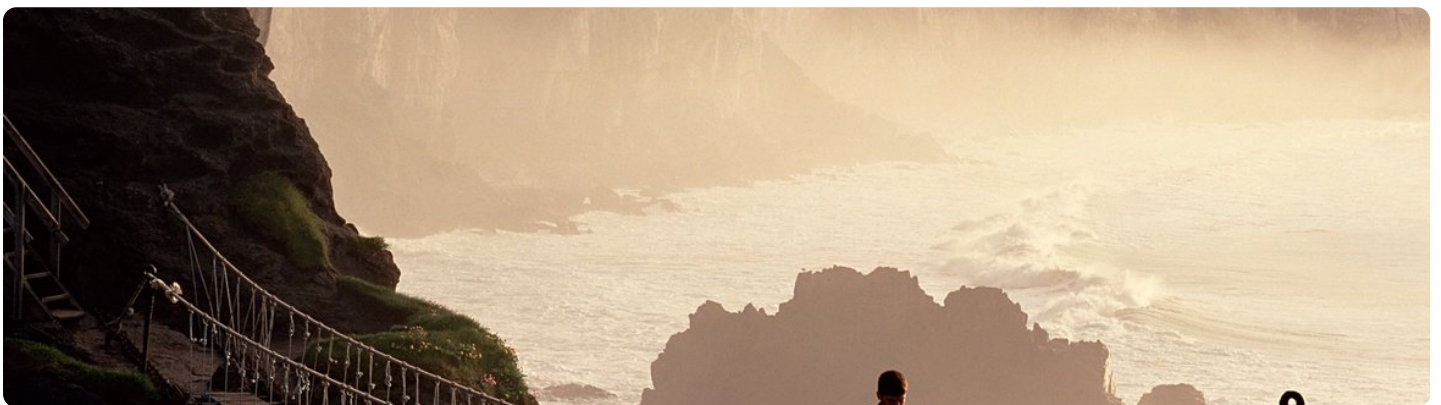

Glenveagh National Park

Glenveagh National Park • Glenveagh National Park, Letterkenny, Ireland



Glenveagh National Park is a remote and hauntingly beautiful wilderness of rugged mountains, pristine lakes, tumbling waterfalls and enchanted native oak woodland in the heart of the Derryveagh Mountains in the north west of County Donegal.

At the centre of the Park on the edge of Lough Veagh is Glenveagh Castle, a late 19th century castellated mansion, built as a hunting lodge. Glenveagh Castle is a 19th century castellated mansion and was built between 1867 and 1873. Its construction in a remote mountain setting was inspired by the Victorian idyll of a romantic highland retreat.

It was designed by John Townsend Trench, a cousin of its builder and first owner, John George Adair, with whom he had been raised in Co. Laois. The designer appears to have imitated the style of earlier Irish Tower-houses adding an air of antiquity to the castle. The building stone chose was granite, plentiful in Donegal but difficult to work and allowing for little detail.

The **climb to the summit is steep and challenging**, especially near the **boggy base**, but offers **breathtaking panoramic views** of the **Donegal countryside**, including **Glenveagh National Park**, the **Poisoned Glen**, and the **Atlantic coastline**.

Part of the **"Seven Sisters" mountain chain**, Errigal is also steeped in **Irish culture and folklore**, symbolizing the region's **wild, untamed beauty**.

Accessible yet majestic, **Mount Errigal** is a **must-visit highlight** for travelers seeking **adventure, scenery, and serenity** in Ireland's remote northwest.

Very few places in Ireland can match the rugged beauty and range of scenery that can be seen from the Sky Road. The route is well signposted from Clifden town and is easy to find. As you travel away from Clifden, you are going up-hill on the Sky Road. Not long after you see the Castle Gates, the road will separate into the lower and upper roads. The lower road goes downhill towards the sea and will give you a very close up view of the landscape, but the upper road is most popular because of the views it offers over the entire area. Here you will find unbeatable views of the Connemara countryside, the Atlantic Ocean, The Islands, and the coastline of Co. Mayo to the North, and Co. Clare to the south. Bare limestone plateau characterized by carboniferous limestone abounding in corals, mollusks and other fossils that lived in the shallow seas over 300 million years ago.

The word “Burren” comes from an Irish word “Boíreann” meaning a rocky place. This is an extremely appropriate name when you consider the lack of soil cover and the extent of exposed Limestone Pavement. However it has been referred to in the past as “Fertile rock” due to the mixture of nutrient rich herb and floral species.

In 1651 a Cromwellian Army Officer named Ludlow remarked, “of this barony it is said that it is a country where there is not water enough to drown a man, wood enough to hang one, nor earth enough to bury them. This last is so scarce that the inhabitants steal it from one another and yet their cattle are very fat. The grass grows in tufts of earth of two or three foot square which lies between the limestone rocks and is very sweet and nourishing.”

The highest point in the park is Knockanes (207 metres) which continues as a curving terraced ridge to Mullaghmór to the south. East of this ridge is an area of extensive, low lying limestone pavement containing a number of semi-permanent lakes. West of this ridge the pavement sweeps down to partially drift-covered ground which gradually rises again to reach the foot of a rocky escarpment. To the south of the park the limestone bedrock disappears under a layer of glacial till. This till area is far more intensively managed for pasture and silage.

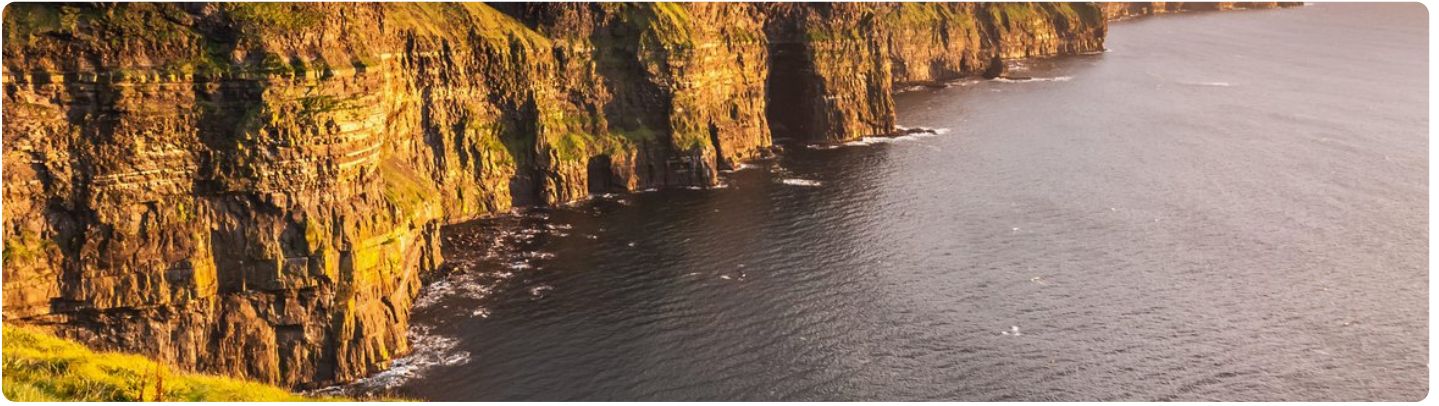

The Cliffs of Moher was a 'tourist attraction' before that phrase was even heard of. In the early 19th century, the then landowner, Cornelius O'Brien, parliamentarian, and proud Clare man, built O'Brien's Tower so that the expansive cliff views across the Atlantic Ocean from Liscannor Bay to Galway Bay could be fully appreciated. This paved the way for today's centre to be the top visitor attraction in Ireland and on the Wild Atlantic Way.

It is now part of the Burren and Cliffs of Moher UNESCO Global Geopark supporting sustainable tourism and has been a special protected area for birds and wildlife since 1979, home to 35 different species of birds. Cliffs of Moher Visitor Experience is a proud member of the Burren Ecotourism Network. See for yourself what has drawn people for over two centuries, it will stir your senses and fill your soul.

Admission includes access to all areas, secure car parking, wi-fi, access to the interactive Cliffs exhibition and water refill stations. In addition, there are two cafes, a craft & gift store and a craft and retail street on the left as you walk out of visitor centre, toilets, first aid centre, information points, baggage storage, free app and audio guide. 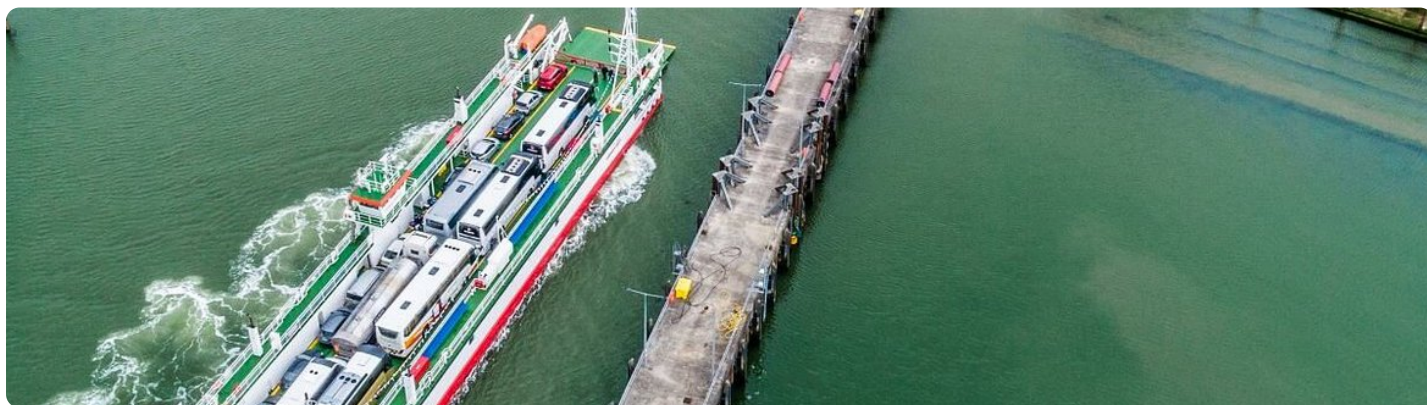

Tarbert Ferry (Killimer -Tabert Ferry)



The **Tarbert Ferry**, officially known as the Killimer–Tarbert ferry service, is a roll-on/roll-off car ferry that crosses the Shannon Estuary in southwest Ireland. It connects County Clare and County Kerry and is one of the most important transport links along the Wild Atlantic Way.

Operated by Shannon Ferries, the service provides a fast and scenic alternative to driving via Limerick, significantly reducing travel time between the two counties while offering passengers beautiful views of the estuary and surrounding coastline.

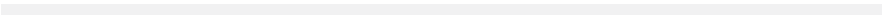

Slea Head Drive, one of Ireland's most scenic routes, takes you on a journey through historic sites, Irish speaking villages, famous Hollywood film locations with close up views of the world renowned Blasket Islands and distant views of the Skellig Islands on the south western horizon. The Slea Head Drive (Slí Cheann Sléibhe) is a circular route, forming part of the Wild Atlantic Way, beginning and ending in Dingle, that takes in a large number of attractions and stunning views on the western end of the Dingle Peninsula. The route is clearly labelled by road signs throughout its length. The Slea Head Route is most enjoyable when done slowly over a number of hours or days allowing time for the many interesting stops and detours along the way. A minimum of a half-day should be set aside for the journey. Travellers are strongly advised to travel clockwise in order to avoid meeting the large tour buses that frequent the route during the summer. Part of the Slea Head cliff road is very narrow and single lane only. The route is suitable for

motorists, but is also enjoyed by cyclists - bicycles can be hired at a number of locations in Dingle.

really has it all, which is why people come from far and wide to see the Ring of Kerry.

This scene-stealing route around the Iveragh Peninsula, beginning and ending in Killarney, takes in all the big hitters – Moll's Gap, Torc Waterfall and the Gap of Dunloe are winners – but really, the route itself is so much more than the sum of its parts. Within this 179km of road, you'll find that each turn brings a new treat to the eye, from lakes, rivers and waterfalls, to grand houses and castles. If you're feeling adventurous, the Ring of Kerry cycling route is one of Ireland's most famous, and there is really nothing like breathing in the fresh Kerry air as you drink up the incredible views around you.

This part of County Kerry is known for its pristine stretches of white, sandy beaches. Derrynane, Rossbeigh and St Finian's Bay are some of the most stunning, each strand a beautiful border between the glinting ocean and mountains of the Iveragh Peninsula.

There's a story behind the stunning "Ladies View" at the Lakes of Killarney – when Queen Victoria visited the Ring of Kerry in 1861, this spot was a favourite of her ladies-in-waiting. And the grandeur doesn't stop at the scenery: sleeping on the edges of the world-famous lakes sits Muckross House & Gardens. This 19th century mansion, along with its lush gardens, became Ireland's first National Park in 1932. Inside is luxury on another level, and upstairs you can even enter the perfectly preserved room that housed Queen Victoria during her famous stay!

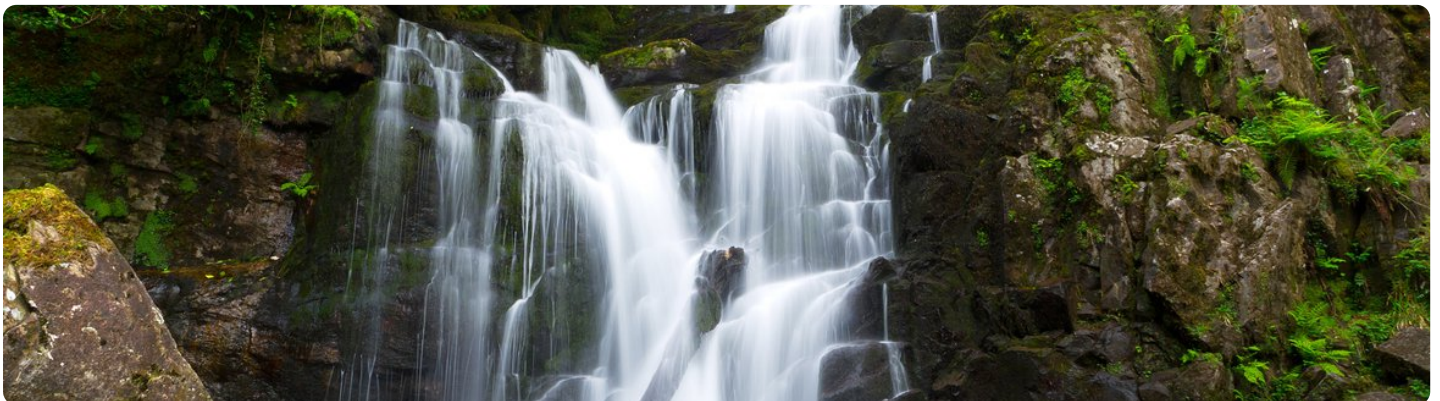

Torc Waterfall is approximately 7 kilometres from Killarney Town and approx 2.5 kilometres from the motor entrance to Muckross House and is signposted from a carpark off the N71. A short walk of approx 200 metres brings you to the waterfall. From that point steps lead to another viewing point at a higher altitude that provides a view over the Middle Lake. The path is also part of the Kerry Way long distance walking route and a starting point for circular walking routes which are indicated by a map down at the start of the trail beside the car park. The waterfall which is approximately 20 metres high is at its best after heavy rainfall. Across the road from the car park jaunting cars can be hired for a trip to Muckross House within the National Park.

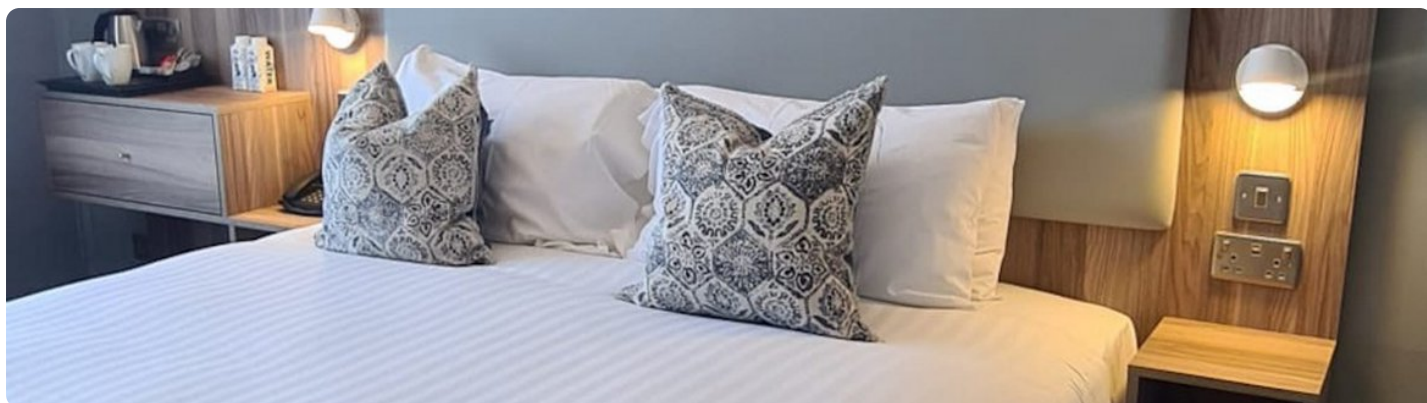

The Rock of Cashel

Set on a dramatic outcrop of limestone in the Golden Vale, the Rock of Cashel, iconic in its historic significance, possesses the most impressive cluster of medieval buildings in Ireland. Among the monuments to be found there is a round tower, a high cross, a Romanesque chapel, a Gothic cathedral, an abbey, the Hall of the Vicars Choral and a fifteenth-century Tower House.

Originally the seat of the kings of Munster, according to legend St. Patrick himself came here to convert King Aenghus to Christianity. Brian Boru was crowned High King at Cashel in 978 and made it his capital.

In 1101 the site was granted to the church and Cashel swiftly rose to prominence as one of the most significant centres of ecclesiastical power in the country.

The surviving buildings are remarkable. Cormac's Chapel, for example, contains the only surviving Romanesque frescoes in Ireland.

The Rock of Cashel is one of Ireland's most spectacular and – deservedly – most visited tourist attractions.
